



St. Mary's Parish Church

I wish you all a very happy Easter. This season lasts for 40 days until the Ascension.

Now that the penitential season of Lent has passed for another year and the Easter Triduum, (Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday) have been celebrated, we celebrate Easter. Christians believe that Christ has died, Christ is Risen and Christ will come again.

In the Liturgy we are reading the accounts of the appearances of the Risen Lord and the formation of the early church. I hope all readers share in the joy of the Risen Lord and that His Peace and Hope fill your lives and the lives of your loved ones wherever they are right now.

The new Papal Nuncio, Archbishop Charles Browne, celebrated the Chrism Mass at our cathedral in Cobh on Wednesday of Holy Week. He led us to believe that it will be a while yet before a new bishop is appointed to Cloyne diocese.

On 12th March I received a copy of a letter from the Department of Education and Skills to the Patron of our two primary schools stating that in meeting projected pupil enrolment increases into the future, the Department considers that a new 32 classroom school with appropriate ancillary accommodation, to accommodate the proposed amalgamation of the two schools, should be provided, subject to a suitable site being identified and secured.

The current schools have not enough space to develop. The site has to be provided by the Patron.

This good news announcement is the culmination of over ten years work started by my predecessor, Mons. Denis Reidy and others.

Further information should be available, hopefully, for the next volume.

So you thought you knew what it takes to get on in the AUL training pitches under lights.

Interviews with the managers of Carrigtwohill United AFC's two teams.

The first team is managed by Liam O'Riordan, with Dave Keohane and John O'Sullivan as assistant managers.

The team is competing in the AUL Premier A division. The second team is managed by Noel Gubbins, with Declan 'Stan' Horgan and James Kavanagh as assistant managers. The team is competing in the AUL Div 3.

Question: What are the challenges facing an AUL coach at the moment?

Liam O'Riordan - The main challenges would be the time committed to run a successful team, with training for 2 hours, 2 nights a week and then about 4 hours on match days. It all adds up to a lot of commitment. Other challenges would be the constant battle to be at your best as every season you face a lot of decent opposition in both league and cups. For this you need to have a decent sized squad which also brings its own problems, as most players playing local soccer do it for a past time and these players don't want to be standing on the line come match days.

Being able to keep a squad of 20 players committed and keen is a very hard task, which is why you would see a lot of changes in teams from year to year.

But I always believe that if you offer decent facilities, have varied and interesting training sessions and be fair to full squad when selecting teams you will keep most players happy. It is probably the main reason we have had a successful couple of years at Carrigtwohill Utd.

Noel Gubbins - There are a number of challenges facing us as coaches, firstly trying to get a team to compete at this level and finding a balance between soccer and family life as we all have young families. Also trying to get lads committed to playing at this level can be quite difficult.

It can also be hard to sell it as some see it as "just Division 3 football". Specifically, motivating young adults can be a challenge as all individuals are different: some you have to put the arm around them and use a softly, softly approach and others need to be constantly plagued to get them going.

Strangely enough, this is my favourite part as you get great satisfaction when things work out.

Also, everyone on the management team is different in their approach which keeps it varied for the lads.

Question: What about the importance of the facilities available to the club?

Liam O'Riordan - This is my second season at Carrigtwohill, and I must compliment the committee and in particular chairman Barry McGrath: the facilities at Ballyadam are second to none, we train on grass all season with having the luxury of 2

This gives us a great advantage over the winter months when most teams are limited in terms of time and surface for training. Our training is very skills focused but at the same time working hard on fitness, but not the boring fitness drills that would put players off training.

We also have 2 excellent pitches which this year have matured into some of the best pitches in the AUL and with the addition of a dedicated grounds man this season, things will only improve further, which is another attraction for players to come and play for Carrigtwohill.

The clubhouse is another positive for the club as players appreciate a hot shower after training or games, again a facility which is not offered at many other AUL clubs.

The club also has an excellent website run by Steve Moore, which is kept up to date weekly, again our players get a lot of enjoyment in looking at match reports and golden boot standings etc.,

Noel Gubbins - For a Junior Soccer team to have a facility such as Ballyadam is another outstanding achievement for Carrig United and a lot of credit needs to go to the officers / committee of the club for this one.

A lot of Clubs around Cork and Munster would love to have a facility like this. This can now be used to attract more players and more support into the club to make it a force to be reckoned with.

Question: Any last words from either of you?

Noel Gubbins - Just a general comment really. Overall Carrig United is in a healthy state at the moment.

Just to sum up it: if you had said to me ten years ago that we would have a growing underage section/two adult teams one in Premier 'A' and doing very well there and a second team competing in the 3rd Division; that we would have a sponsor like 'Ballyseedy' and a facility like 'Ballyadam', I would have said you were "off your head". But that is now the case. Onwards and upwards – that's the only way now.

AUL Premier A League v Castleview in Ballyadam Park on Saturday 31st March Castleview 3 Carrigtwohill United 1 Scorer - Leonard Healy

Carrig were defeated in this one by promotion rivals Castleview. The game started at a very high pace with both teams going at it and it was a very even game until Castleview opened the scoring after 15mins after a clearance from a corner hit a defender on the way to safety and the ball broke nicely for the Castleview player to finish with a powerful strike.

The game remained tight but Castleview always looked the more likely to score and indeed they added a second on 25 minutes when a nicely delivered cross from the left was finished by the Castleview frontman,

Carrig did up the pressure in search of a goal before the break but when a nice move put Chris Casey in the striker could only hit the side net. It stayed 2 - nil at half time.

The second half saw Carrig attacking more as Castleview sat deeper and looked to defend their lead but always were a threat on the break. And on 55 minutes Castleview scored a third from a ball over the top, the striker looked offside but was allowed to play on and finished superbly with a lob over the advancing keeper.

Carrig kept on plugging away to try get something out of a game that was slipping away from them. But the Castleview defence were superb and gave little chances to Carrig. Carrig did pull one back on 75minutes from a penalty by Leonard Healy. This gave Carrig a glimmer of hope and they pushed Castleview all the way for the remainder of the game, where we created a number of decent chances but failed to convert and the game finished 3 - 1 to the visitors.

Ballyseedy Man of the Match - Garry O'Mahony.

Under-14 Div 4 League v Avondale United A in Ballyadam Park on Saturday 31st March Carrigtwohill United 4 Avondale United A 5

Carrig played well, scored 4 goals and still got nothing from

another game that should have been won. The home team started well with the midfield trio of Tom O'Brien, Brendan Twomey and Billy Manning working well together.

Most of Carrig's threat came down their right and this is where the first goal was made. The ball was worked well down the right side and when the cross beat the defence it fell to Ben O'Leary on the left side of the penalty area. He struck it well bringing a great save from the keeper, but Billy Manning struck home the rebound from 12 yards out.

Carrig continue to press and scored again after 20 minutes. This time the attack came down the left. The ball was crossed along the edge of the penalty area where Tom O'Brien won the race with the advancing keeper and coolly lobbed him from 18 yards to give the home team a 2-0 lead.

Avondale responded well and scored twice before half to level it. Both goals could be put down to a hesitant Carrig defence. Crosses that should have been cleared allowed the faster reacting strikers to score.

The second half brought the same level of good football and excitement as the first. Carrig took the lead again when Liam-

Gosnell got a foot to a great cross from the right and the ball flew into the far corner from the edge of the box.

The visitors began to dominate then and scored another 2 goals to take the lead for the first time, with only 15 mins remaining. This time Carrig responded well and where level quickly. Conor Keegan was allowed to control the ball and once he turned on to his left foot just inside the box, there's always only one outcome. He hammered the ball into the net for his 11th of the season. (10 in the last 8 games).

It looked as though the teams would share the points, but Avondale broke Carrig's hearts by poaching a goal at the death. Another cross from the right caused hesitancy in the defence and the striker poked it over the Carrig keeper from close range.


100 years ago - Introduction of 15-a-side teams.

On Sunday, 16th. June 1912, in the Cork Athletic Grounds, two Carrig Players, Jimmy Kennedy and Tim 'Killarney O'Leary' played on the Cork Senior Hurling team against Limerick in one of the first experiments with 15 a-side teams. On a beautiful day a crowd of 3,000 saw Cork win by 7-4 to 3-2. "Killarney", reportedly, did well, but Kennedy was the star scoring 4-1.

The "Examiner", however, was sceptical about the new format: "as regards the adoption of 15 a-side, it is doubtful if the adoption of this system would be successful. The game is played during the summer months and with the intense heat that is invariably experienced, it would seem in the interests of the players that the best course would be to have the old rule of 17 players on each side continue". Within months 15 a-side was adopted.

New Building for Amalgamated School

Good news at last! The long awaited (almost 10 years) announcement has finally been made.

It is clear that the Department has finally recognised the urgent need for school accommodation in Carrigtwohill and the wider East Cork area.

The announcement includes the following

New post primary school for Midleton/Carrigtwohill New national school for Midleton/Carrigtwohill

New school Carrigtwohill/Midleton

Midleton Educate Together Market Green

Gael Scoil Mainister na Curran

CBS Castleredmond Midleton

St. Colman's Community College, Youghal Road, Midleton Glanmire Community College

Carrigtwohill Amalgamation Carrigtwohill

All of this is very positive for the children of Carrigtwohill and of course their parents. The pressure which parents have experienced in recent years in trying to find places for their children, particularly at secondary school level is unacceptable. The final go-ahead for the construction of the new school building for the amalgamation of the existing primary schools and the announcement of a secondary school for the Carrigtwohill/Midleton area is indeed welcome.

Recent presentations by the VEC confirmed that the Department has requested the VEC to source a site for the proposed secondary school in the Carrigtwohill area. The understanding at the moment therefore is that that school will in fact be located in Carrigtwohill and would be intended to service the ever increasing population of the area.

Choice will not be a problem as St. Aloysius College will continue to provide places for local girls and additional places will be created in CBS and St. Colman's Community College, Midleton and Glanmire Community College.

The Department has confirmed that, if the Trustees will provide a site, the Department will fund a 32 classroom school for the amalgamated primary schools

Looking forward to next year and subsequent years, the primary school enrolment is projected to grow considerably and therefore it is anticipated that by the time the school is built, the requirement will be close to 32 classrooms.

There is no doubt that the amalgamation, the site acquisition and the subsequent construction of the school will present challenges. However the benefits are long awaited and most welcome.

Design possibilities for the new school might include one large building or two smaller buildings with shared facilities. All of this has yet to be decided and will be subject to consultation with stakeholders.

In the meantime Scoil Chlochair Mhuire and Scoil Mhuire Naofa continue to cater for the primary school children of the community.

While promises of construction have now been received, constraints on government finances might still give rise to delays in actually delivering the finished product.

Parents are therefore strongly advised to contact the existing primary schools as early as possible to indicate whether children will be enrolling so as to allow the schools to plan for accommodation requirements between now and the building of the new school.

Carrigtwohill Men's Shed; Shoulder to Shoulder

Did you know that we have had a Men's Shed in Carrigtwohill since January of this year?

A Men's Shed, to borrow that overused tagline, does exactly what is says on the metaphorical tin.

It is a communal shed, a place where men can work together or individually on projects such as mechanics or woodwork, a place where men can enjoy the craic and a joke in a spirit of comradeship. It's a shed where you can ask for help if you need to, and it's a place where you might have sound advice or a skill to teach others.

The Carrig Shed is a community-based organization which is open to all men where the key activity is the provision of a friendly and inclusive environment where the men are able to gather and work on meaningful projects at their own pace.

In the shed in Castlelake, you will find a group of lads working on projects like our raised vegetable beds, the rebuilding of the old Yamaha scooter for resale or the building of workbenches for the workshop.

The group has a mixture of ages, backgrounds, interests and skills all of which are united by the common goal of building a sustainable Men's Shed for the community.

On the surface a Men's Shed might seem like the old fashioned Garden Shed, and in many ways it is, but a Men's Shed also offers lots more subtle benefits for all involved such as increasing men's social networks and learning new skills. As men age, or as many nowadays find themselves unemployed, the loss of friends and feelings of isolation can easily take a negative toll on our minds. It is commonly understood, if not often spoken about, that men are happiest when tinkering with an old engine or seeing a broken piece of furniture come back to life. It is this very sleeves-rolled-up busyness that is harnessed in a Men's Shed, after all, "men don't talk face to face; they talk shoulder to shoulder".

The shed began in earnest with the donation of two cabins on a small site in Castlelake.

As the group began the jobs of rounding up second hand tools, mending the sheds and building the raised vegetable beds, it was clear that something significant had found it's footing in Carrigtwohill. It is not just the men of the area however that will benefit alone from the Men's





Shed, as the shedders plan to work with local community groups and voluntary agencies for the betterment of the Carrigtwohill people and the Carrigtwohill area. As the revamp of the old scooter is completed, some of the proceeds of the sale will be reinvested in the community while the remaining funds will go towards the next project.

The Carrigtwohill Men's Shed had received very generous support so far from Bam Construction Ltd, Cluid Housing Association, Carrigtwohill FRC and CB Motorcycles, however, as a growing project, the Men's Shed will continue to require funding as it welcomes new members.

Pat Burke Celebrates 65 years in the Music Business









In the Garden

with Michael Clancy, Fota Garden Centre



Spring has got to be the most welcome time of year. There is a great stretch in the evenings and temperatures during March were record breaking.

Every year I advise gardeners to get all their pruning done during the dormant months and the importance of manure and compost top dressings. However on close examination of my own garden, I see little evidence of this advice being carried out

Weeds are rampant at the moment with all the fine weather. Plucking weeds from shrub beds can be very effective in small gardens, but in larger properties chemical are the only reasonable solution especially in ornamental beds where there is no food crops being produced.

Now is a great time for planning and planting new borders or just adding to existing ones.

Check out some of the spring stock in the garden centre at the moment.

Many people are afraid of planting Phormiums, Cordylines and Astelia due to the extreme cold we experienced over the past few years. Now after a mild winter and all the signs of a good summer ahead, I think we owe the tender plants another chance.

Check out Phormium Allison Blackman or Phormium Platts Black, both these Phormium will definitely pay rent in any position in your garden you chose, both have great colour and form, with a nice bit of exotic style.

Spring has got to be the most welcome time of year.

Cordyline Torbay Dazzler is a favourite of mine, unlike its green cousin, it does not tend to reach for the stars. Staying firmly planted on the ground, it will give you a spread of 3 feet and an initial height of 3 feet, growing to a maximum of 6 feet. Keep the trunk clean at all times and feed during the spring months.

Astelia are like the previously mentioned shrubs, from New Zealand. While they will all thrive in our climate, they will all have some difficulties with some of the winter temperatures we have experienced in recent times.

Silver Sword is a good strongly coloured variety which provides you with a nice piece of architecture for your garden.
When grown in good well drained posi-

tion, this will reduce the chances of losing them in severe conditions.

When ever I suggest planting Bamboo, I feel customers recoil in fear. There is no reason for such fear, there are hundreds of different varieties of Bamboo, some are thugs but others can be beautiful specimens.

Fargesia Asian Wonder is one of my favourite. It is a dense clump forming bamboo with a light feather like stem. It will reach 15 feet without a problem.

Phyllostachy aureocaulis is a beautiful specimen which is grown for it's yellow canes, it is not nearly as dense as the previous Fargesia but can grow just as tall. It's a good idea to strip off the lower leaves in order to expose the canes. Placing river rocks underneath the bamboo gives an impression of water without the mess. It can be difficult to grow much underneath the bamboo as the bamboo will complete for what ever water is available.

When ever you plant new material in a border, it is important to add in additional organic material. While compost is always available in the garden centre, it is important to create your own with what ever waste you have. Bin charges have increased in recent times and in my opinion it makes no sense to pay to dispose of organic material when you can compost it and use it again in your garden.

The standard Carbery Compost bin is the most popular one in use. Include all uncooked vegetable waste from the kitchen, coffee grinds, tea bags, egg shells, grass cuttings, annual weeds, dead headed flowers and clippings.

Making good compost is like making good soup, chuck it all in there and allow it to stew under it's own steam. Having a good mix is very important. To speed up the process, add in some enzymes which can be purchased at the garden centre. Shake a hand full on the top every time you add more to the mix.





The 4 Year Plan

The Plan is based on:

- Research by the members
- A desire to improve our built, cultural and natural environment
- A necessity to address local issues which heretofore have not been given sufficient publicity
- A willingness to continue to develop relationships with Cork County Council (example the 1999 landscaping plan drawn up by Jack Casey, Horticulturist and landscape gardener with the local authority.
- The result of a report commissioned by East Cork Area Development (ECAD) for the Tidy towns Group. This environmental report was prepared by Donaldson Tourism and Heritage Consultancy. This report will form part of our Action Plan over the coming years and is a very significant document in the development of Carrigtwohill
- A desire to encourage local participation in the process and the development of Carrigtwohill by the Residents and Companies alike.
- An existing and continuing appreciation by SECAD of the needs and requirements of Carrigtwohill under their Rural Development Programme.
- A desire that all other Community Groups will play their part in implementing this plan.
- Survey by Carrigtwohill Community Council in 1999 regarding needs of residents including Local Area Plan.

Year 1

- Enter Tidy Towns Competition
- Theme (Stone) incorporating signage. The group has decided to develop a theme which will incorporate stone as a principal component. The name "Carrig" meaning "rock" will be used on all approach roads. These rocks will be appropriately engraved by a stone mason.
- There are 5 derelict sites in the village and approaches must be made to these property owners regarding screening or removal.
- Draw up a litter control plan for the parish.
- Wirescape problem Talk to Eircom and ESB networks.
- Place large boxes with trees in the village by agreement with Local Area Engineer.
- Follow recommendations on The Donaldson Environmental Report regarding grass cutting. Spray Shrub beds or use membrane. (ref Appendix 2)
- Complete Wildlife survey and plan.
- Ensure that all other community groups, clubs, associations and schools play their part in implementing this plan.
- Plan to have Mastersons House the focal point for our creativity.
- Signage plan. Research the need for quality signage

within the village including street signs, sponsors signs, bollards etc. Address the issue of signage clutter including auctioneering signs. Talk to Individual offenders.

- Begin a best kept Estate Competition
- Draft a painting plan for the village. Paint Speed
 Limit signs, gates, railing and wash all signs. Kerbing
 needs repainting. Meet with the Area Engineer of
 Cork County Council.
- Sponsorship contact all companies and ask for sponsorship. Identify a main sponsor.
- Fundraising events, Tidy towns competition and grant applications apply for same.
- Draw detailed map showing where and when work will be completed. Work in tandem with Dave Clarke, Area Engineer Cork County Council.
- Facilitate the setting up of as many Residents Associations as possible.
- Work closely with the business association, e.g. implement hanging basket plan.
- Develop an art competition for the hoardings for example, draw the Old Barry's shop on the hoarding around the site of the old shop.
- Complete walkway to Fota Business Park (Ballyseedy).
- Liaise with the Probation Services.
- Identify 100 new volunteers

Year 2

- Enter Tidy Towns Competition
- Draw up a wirescape plan
- Tree planting in the Tullagreen area.
- Litter Control
- Display Panels for Wildlife Projects
- Landscaping the entrance to Fota Rock
- Implement Wildlife Projects
- Hanover Industrial Estate; talk to owners of these businesses regarding improvements and draw up a plan for improvement of the estate.
- Carrigtwohill has not benefited greatly from the bypass road. Implement the traffic engineer's report drawn up by Cork County Council.

- Paint all farm gates black.
- Continue to identify sources of sponsorship.
- Organise a fundraising event.

- Develop the old derelict site, formerly a garage, on the main street.
- Facelift to Community Centre and car park.
- Install extra litter bins.
- Identify 100 new volunteers.
- Liaise with the Probation Services.


