Christmas

Christmas tends to creep up quickly so make a start now and give yourself plenty of time.

Plan menus and make a list of how many you'll be feeding, with notes about any dislikes or dietary problems. Place orders for meat and special treats such as salmon.

Clear out the fridge and freezer to make room for extra food and find somewhere cool to dark ie the garage or shed for the inevitable overflow. This is also a good place to defrost food.



Start buying luxuries and booze now to help spread the cost

Check the last posting date for Christmas cards.

Stock up on time saving ingredients such as ready-made pastry, breadcrumbs, nibbles and ice-creams.

Check your kitchen equipment and make sure you have everything you need. Foil turkey roasting trays are great at this time of year as they are cheap and you can chuck them out after the meal – so no greasy washing up.

2 weeks to go

Buy non-perishable groceries such as tins, jars and packets and household essentials such as washing up liquid, toilet rolls and blank videos/dvds to record your favourite films.

Make lots of ice cubes and store in bags in the freezer.

Wrap up all your presents

Fetch the decorations down from the attic, check that the lights are working and replace if necessary.

Post your Christmas cards

1 week to go

Check you have enough plates, bowls and glasses if you're cooking for a large crowd.

If you have quests staying sort out your bedlinen and towels and make sure they are all clean.

2 Days to go



Pick up your turkey or remove from the freezer and leave in a cool place to thaw out.

Shop for your fresh vegetables and fruit and other perishables.

Christmas is just around the corner so follow these easy recipes for a tasty Christmas meal.

Mulled Wine (Serves 8)

To serve 8: pour 1 bottle of red wine into a pan and add 1 mulled wine sachet, a few slices of orange, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz of sugar and $\frac{1}{2}$ pt of orange juice or water. Bring to the boil, then reduce the heat and simmer gently for 10-15 mins. Stir in 4 tbsp brandy or port. Serve in heatproof glasses with sugar frosted rims – simply brush the rim of each glass with water and dip into caster sugar.

Starters:

Chilli and Lime Prawns (Serves 4)

Serves 4: 12oz Cooked Tiger prawns, juice from 2 limes, 1 red chilli finely chopped, 2 tbsp soy sauce, 2 tsp sesame oil, 1 tsp caster sugar, ½ a cucumber



Peel the prawns leave on the tail and place in a bowl, Whisk together the lime juice, chilli, soy sauce, sesame oil and caster sugar and pour over the prawns. Cover and leave to marinate for 30 mins. Pare the cucumber into thin ribbons. Divide between four serving plates and season with ground black pepper. Divide the prawns between the four plates, pour over the marinade and serve. You could also cover and leave to chill in the fridge for 2-3hrs before serving if you wish.

Garlic Mushrooms.(Serves 10)

Serves 10: 4oz butter, 3 garlic cloves chopped, 2 tbsp chopped parsley, salt and pepper, 11oz mushrooms.

Soften the butter in a bowl, add the garlic, parsley and seasoning and mix together. Cover and chill. Cut the stalks from the mushrooms and spoon a little of the garlic mixture on to each mushroom. Roast in a preheated over at Gas 4/180oC/350oF for 20-22mins.

Main Course:

Roast Turkey and Stuffing - the quick way

Serves 6-8: 10lb-12lb turkey (giblets removed and wishbone removed), Salt and pepper, 2 large carrots peeled, 1 large onion peeled, 2 sticks of celery, 1 leek, 2 bay leaves, 1 x 75cl bottle of dry white wine, chicken stock cube, 2oz melted butter, 4tbsp cornflour mixed with 8tbsp water.



Preheat the oven to Gas 6/200oC/400oF.

Season the bird well both inside and out pack the stuffing (see below) into the neck cavity. Tie the legs and parson's nose together with some string. Chop up all the vegetables into large chunks and place in a roasting tin leaving at least a 2" gap all round. Add the bay leaves.

Place the turkey on top of the vegetables, pour in the white wine, ½ pint of cold water and the chicken stock cube. Place the roasting tin on the hob. Bring to the boil then cover very carefully with two layers of tin foil making sure to seal the top edge of the tin. The steam cooks the turkey so make sure you get as much as possible in and around the bird.

Place the covered bird in the oven and cook for about 1hour 5mins, to check if the bird is cooked insert a knife where the thigh attaches itself to the turkey – the juices should run clear, if not cover again and cook for a further 20mins.

When the bird is cooked, remove from the oven and turn the heat up to Gas 8/230oC/450oF. Lift the bird out of the tin and place in a clean roasting tin(a foil roasting tin is ideal – no washing up) Once the oven is at the right temperature, pour the melted butter over the turkey, pop back into the oven for about 10-15mins so it browns evenly. Once browned, remove from the oven, cover with foil and keep warm.

To make the gravy, strain the juices from the roasting tin into a saucepan and stir well. Bring to the boil and simmer gently to reduce the stock. Add the cornflour and water or some chicken gravy granules and bring to the boil stirring until thickened. When you carve the bird, the flesh will be soft and juicy.

Chestnut Stuffing

2tbsp veg oil, 1 small onion, chopped finely, 1 garlic clove chopped, 2tbsp of fresh thyme or 1tbsp of dried, 1lb of sausage meat, 6tbsp of breadcrumbs, 1 medium egg, 6oz of chestnuts peeled, Salt and Pepper.

Heat the oil in a saucepan, add the onion and garlic and cook until soft. Add the thyme and sausage meat and stir well. Cool slightly and add enough breadcrumbs to stiffen the mixture, stir in the egg and beat the mixture well, add the chestnuts and season. Use to stuff the turkey when required.

Brussels sprouts (with a twist)

1lb of sprouts trimmed, 1oz unsalted butter, 3tbsp olive oil, black mustard seeds, 1oz ginger finely chopped, 3 small shallots finely chopped, 3 pinches of nutmeg, Salt and Pepper.

Cook the sprouts in boiling water for about 10mins, cool under cold running water and drain well, heat the butter and oil, add the mustard seeds, ginger, shallots and nutmeg. Heat gently for a few mins, add the sprouts and turn them in the mixture to coat thoroughly, season with a little salt and pepper.

Honey-roasted parsnips

2lb parsnips, 4fl oz vegetable oil, 2tbsp clear honey, Salt and Pepper.

Peel, top and tail the parsnips, cut length ways and then quarter. Heat the oil in a baking tin in a hot oven for 10mins. Bring a pan of salted water to the boil add the parsnips and bring back to the boil and simmer for 1 min maximum (or they will fall to pieces) Drain well and carefully lay in the very hot oil and season with salt and pepper. Return to the oven. Cook for 35mins and carefully turn over and cook for a further 30mins or until crispy, pour over the honey and glaze for 5mins (They burn very quickly so keep an eye on them)

Desserts:

Mincemeat and Apple mini strudels (Makes 8)

8tbsp mincemeat, 1 small cooking apple peeled and grated coarsely, 8 sheets of filo pastry about 7" x 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ ", 2oz butter melted, icing sugar to dust.

Preheat the oven to 200oC/400oF/Gas 6. Mix the mincemeat and grated apple, take one sheet of filo pastry and brush with melted butter, place a spoonful of the mincemeat mixture along



one short end, fold in a little of the pastry along the long side, then roll up to enclose the filling. Place seam side down on a large greased baking tray. Repeat with the rest, brush with melted butter. Bake for 10-15mins until the pastry is crisp and golden. Cool for 5mins then cut in half, dust with the icing sugar and serve with fresh cream

or ice cream.

These can be made in advance and heated up on the day.

Chocolate and Rum Mousse(Makes 4)


6oz plain chocolate broken into rough pieces, 2tbsp rum, ½ pt of double cream, 3tbsp greek yogurt, 2tbsp caster sugar, chocolate shavings and edible coloured balls to decorate.

Place the chocolate and rum in a bowl and set over a pan of simmering water. Leave until melted, remove from the heat and gently stir in 3tbsp of the cream until smooth, cool for 10mins, Pour the rest of the cream into a large bowl and whip until peaking Leave aside 4tbsp of the cream for decoration. Fold the yogurt and sugar into the remaining cream in the bowl, then fold in the melted chocolate mixture, spoon into four small glasses, top with the reserved cream and decorate with the shavings and edible coloured balls.

Vanilla Ice-Cream Coffee Shots (Serves 6)

500g tub of luxury vanilla ice cream softened, 2tbsp brown sugar, 2tbsp coffee flavoured liqueur such as Tia Maria, ½ pt strong warm black coffee.

Scoop the ice-cream into small balls and place on a foil-lined baking sheet. Return to the freezer and 1-2 hrs until very firm. Divide the ice-cream scoops

Presentation to East Cork Area Roads Committee 27th of November 2007

A delegation from Carrigtwohill Community Council attended a meeting of the East Cork Roads Committee on 27th November last to discuss the dissatisfaction locally in relation to the N25 and the local road network generally.

The following is a synopsis of the issues and concerns that were presented at that meeting

Concerns to be Addressed:-

1. Upgrade on N25 and Interchange at Amgen Site

Planning Permission was granted to Amgen on the basis that a major upgrade to the roads and sewerage infrastructure in the Carrigtwohill area was to be undertaken. Both the NRA and Cork County Council were consulted and given an opportunity to set out their requirements before allowing any work to commence on the site.

The departure of Amgen is regrettable for all concerned and the consequences for the Community of Carrigtwohill are serious.

Work was commenced towards the construction of a new junction on the N25 at the Amgen site including the following:-

- (a) Various medians along the N25 between Carrigtwohill and Midleton were closed,
- (b) traffic lights were installed at the Amgen site,
- (c) there was interference with the junction of the Hedgey Boreen and the N25.

There has been a huge impact on the local Community during the course of the road works and the sewage works to facilitate the Amgen proposed development. These works were undertaken or authorised by our Local Authority and the NRA and, while it is very regrettable that the Amgen contribution to the cost has been lost, the Local Authority and/or the NRA who authorised the commencement of these works now must accept responsibility for completing them.

The current situation is entirely unacceptable. Some of the difficulties are as follows;

- (A) to access the "John A Wood Road" drivers travelling from the west now have two choices;
- (i) do a dangerous u-turn at the next median opening near Healys Quarry (unless, of course, the plan to close this median proceeds) or,
- (ii) go into Midleton town and use the interchange there. This will serve to worsen the existing traffic congestion in the town of Midleton.
- (B) to access the N25 eastward, drivers from the John A Woods road have two choices; 3.

- (i) enter into the village of Carrigtwohill thereby exacerbating an already dangerously congested junction at the Costcutters Supermarket or,
- (ii) travel an extra distance of approximately 1 ½ miles round trip to use the Tullagreine interchange.

Unless and until the interchange/flyover on the N25 is completed one of the following must occur:-

- 1. (a) All central medians must be reopened and the "John A. Woods Junction" must be reinstated as it was prior to the recent works and
- (b) The Hedgy Boreen Junction at the N25 must be reinstated as it was prior to the recent works or,
- 2. The temporary traffic light junction which was proposed at the Amgen site must proceed fully including the construction of the new link road from the John A. Wood roads to the N25 and from the Hedgy Boreen to the N25.

If any private individual wishes to undertake a significant development, Cork County Council insists on security being put in place to ensure the completion of that development. It is therefore incumbent on Cork County Council and the NRA, having allowed work to commence on the N25, to now undertake and complete those works.

The fact that Amgen's contribution to the work may now be lost does not remove the responsibility from the NRA or the Local Authority to fulfil their part of their contract with the local community to finish what was started.

The following questions must now be answered:-

- . What was the anticipated budget of the proposed interchange at Amgen.
- . How was this cost to be funded and in particular;
 - (a) what was the contribution from the Local Authority,
 - (b) what was the contribution from Amgen,
 - (c) what was the contribution from the NRA
 - (d) was there any other Government Department or Body to contribute funding either directly or indirectly by way of contribution to the Local Authority or the NRA. If so what Government Office or Department was to make this contribution.

If the funding for the interchange was not fully secured, why were the works on the Amgen site allowed

commence at all.

- 4. How much of a contribution has already been collected from Amgen and what commitment has been obtained from Amgen with regard to future contributions to be paid (if any)
- 5. Of the other parties who were to contribute towards the cost of the interchange which (if any of them) have withdrawn their funding from the project and what reasons have been given.

The planning and zoning process constitutes a contract with the local community. In this case the people of Carrigtwohill were given assurances with regard to the upgrading of the infrastructure locally on foot of which they waived their rights to object through the planning process. Unless the Local Authority and the NRA now fulfil their part of the Contract with the local community, the faith of local communities everywhere in the planning process will be seriously undermined.

2 Secondary Roads

The secondary roads between Carrigtwohill and Midleton have suffered hugely during the recent infrastructural works. The condition of the roads, in particular the Ballintubber Road, is entirely unacceptable and it is imperative that immediate steps are taken to address the subsidence which has arisen on this road, prior to the recent infrastructural works which were significantly worsened by virtue of the additional traffic on that road during the infrastructural works. Again, this is an issue which was flagged by Carrigtwohill Community Council well in advance of the infrastructural works being undertaken but, unfortunately, our warnings fell on deaf ears.

3. Amenity Provision

Members of Carrigtwohill Community Council met on the 19th of September 2006 with the then County Manager, Mr. Maurice Maloney as well as Mr. John O'Dell, Mr. John O'Neill and Mr. Noel O'Keeffe and Mr. Ned Flynn from Cork County Council. Concerns were raised by us in relation to the provision of amenity facilities to compensate for the impact of the major infrastructural works in the area. These infrastructural works were undertaken not for the benefit of the residents of Carrigtwohill but to facilitate the implementation of Cork County Council's Development Plan and to facilitate the development of the Amgen Site.

The Management of Cork County Council present at that meeting agreed that a fair portion of the development contributions being collected in the Carrigtwohill area should be spent in the area to provide amenity facilities.

A commitment was given by Cork County Council at that meeting that, on the completion of the sewerage works which were then in their infancy, Cork County Council would resurface all roads affecting by the sewerage works and would implement a proper land-scaping scheme and would also upgrade the public lighting and in particular consider the installation of

attractive public lighting in the town centre.

It was also agreed that it was fair that Cork County Council should apply some of the development contributions collected in Carrigtwohill towards the provision of amenity facilities in the Carrigtwohill area and the Carrigtwohill Community Council was invited to submit its proposals with regard to such facilities. The proposals we submitted included such basic requirements as safe footpaths and cycle paths and public lighting along areas developed under Planning Permissions granted by Cork County Council. Despite various written and verbal submissions to-date no commitment has been forthcoming from Cork County Council to anyone of the proposals put forward.

Pride in our Community Competition 2007 The Red Roundabout

The Pride in our Community 2007 Environmental Project/ Competition was a coordinated joint venture by Cork County Federation of Muintir na Tire and Cork County Council.

The main aim of the competition was to develop a new or existing community based amenity/ project which would be of long-term benefit to the community. The competition also sought to make people conscious of their environment and to promote an awareness of litter free communities and the overall impressions of an area.

The Pride in our Community Competition was open to any voluntary group.

There were three categories in the competition based on the following criteria:

Category 1. Population Centres of less than 1000 people

Category 2. Population Centres over 1000 people not having an Urban District Council.

Category 3. Population Centres having an Urban District Council.

The Tidy Towns Committee had agreed that the development of the Roundabout at the Barryscourt entrance to the village would form a significant part of their work for 2007 and it was decided to enter this Project for the Competition under Category 2.

The project involved a total refurbishment of the Roundabout at the Barryscourt entrance to the village and a plan of action was drawn up.

The red signpost at the centre of the roundabout provided the theme and it was agreed that as far as possible red stones and shrubs would be used to link with the Signpost colour. Hence the name, The Red Roundabout.

As a first step a sleepers were placed around the signpost in an octagonal shape to form a shrub bed. This area was then covered with top soil, weed block and stones and then a variety of shrubs (mainly red) were planted.

The next step was to develop the outer circle and the external grassed area was removed.

This area had to be levelled manually. Weedblock was then laid down and sandstone and limestone were placed. In time, Phormium Pink Panther were added to the outer circle to continue the red theme.

At this point we had come through the 1st level of the competition with 87%, which was extremely high marking. This high mark was a very encouraging point and the committee then decided to develop the islands around the roundabout. All the grass which had overgrown on to the footpaths was removed with edgers, hedges were trimmed; the area around all the trees was cleaned, weed blocked and covered with stones. Weeds were removed from the kerbside and overgrown kerbs were cleared with edgers. The grass was cut neatly and all the beds were strimmed. All the gravel was removed from around the roundabout and the bricked islands were cleaned of moss and weeds. Shrubs were planted where possible in keeping with the centre of the roundabout and in keeping with the red

The project was awarded 87% again in the 2nd judging of the competition. The final judging was done in early August.

The results of the Competition were announced in Oriel House





in Ballincollig on Tuesday 23 October, 2007.

All the participants in the competition were invited to attend and there was a power point presentation of all the projects submitted for the Competition.

The County Mayor, Cllr. John Patrick O'Shea, presented the prizes.

Representatives of the Tidy Towns Committee attended the presentation and Carrigtwohill Red Roundabout was placed 2nd in its Category with a project in Millstreet taking 1st prize.

The prize was €400 and a framed certificate. This was a great achievement considering it was the first time that we had entered the competition.

A further Category entitled "The Most Creative Project" was also included in the competition and the Red Roundabout in Carrigtwohill had the great honour of winning this prize.

The prize was a cheque for €200, a framed certificate and a beautiful 12" high Galway Crystal vase.

The representatives present felt very proud and privileged to receive this prestigious award on behalf of those people who worked so hard on the project during the summer.

The work involved is estimated to have taken over 100 m/woman hours.

The Tidy Towns Committee is a small group but a number of local residents helped to a huge extent with the work in-

volved and the Committee would like to pay tribute to the great commitment of the Barryscourt people who worked so hard on this project.

We were particularly pleased to have a number of our young people involved.

The Competition is run on an annual basis so we look forward to coming up with another project in 2008.

History of Carrigtwohill

Christmas Memories of Carrigtwohill in the 1930's

Rolling back the years over half a century ago, before the pace of life ever began to increase as distinct from today, the author will muse over his memories and will recall the stories of those golden years.

Beginning with a religious flavour, the most noticeable preparation in the houses for Christmas was the use of red berry holly and ivy to decorate every available holding space of the living quarters - be it the kitchen or the living room. On the weeks and days leading to the festive day, people would even cycle to Ballyadam, where you were sure to get the finest growth of variegated holly.

As money was scarce at that time, cash flow was disciplined only to make Christmas Day special for the children. December 8th, Feast of the Immaculate Conception, was a definite date in the calendar of many households. This was traditionally a day when the country folk would visit Cork City to make their purchases of working clothes and boots.

As the more well off visited the larger shops, the poorer class were to be found striking a bargain for second hand clothes at the Coal Quay Market.

Customers of O'Connell's shop in Carrigtwohill, (current location of *Et Cetera*), were always in receipt of a Christmas hamper gift. It would consist of a large cake, a candle, a bottle of wine and a plum pudding. Our eyes would dance as the box was opened and in spite of having a good idea of what was inside, the anticipation and excitement was heartfelt! Stories told by our parents at the fireside (remember no electricity, radio or television!!), reminded us of families in poor circumstances who would have the kettle boiling on the hob of the fireplace, waiting in anticipation for the O'Connell's van on Christmas Eve and what Christmas cheer the sound of it's engine brought, as it made it's way along the country roads.

Another tale recounted is that of two farm labourers, Pad and Mick who were working for an English gentleman around the 1920's. As darkness fell on Christmas Eve, the old squire addressed his men and wishing them a happy Christmas, informed them that the cook had a special treat for them to compliment the festive season.

In the kitchen they found themselves comforted with a dinner that surpassed their own imagination. On the plate were; turkey and ham, Brussel sprouts, cauliflower and bread stuffing. The beautiful Kerr Pink's potatoes were on another plate bursting in their skins before their eyes - to tempt them. To crown it all were two bottles of stout to wash it all down!

As they began their meal, Mick turned to his workmate and said "Pad, shor we can't eat this dinner because this is a Black Fast Day on Christmas Eve and we are forbidden to eat meat".

"Oh! Be quiet you idiot", responded Pad, "this is our Christmas dinner, we won't have anything like this tomorrow so you may as well eat it and enjoy it".

And so they did to their hearts content.

Memories of Christmas Eve, recall the presence of decorated lit candles on the window sill's of every house and the very large number of people who went to Confession in preparation for the Feast Day. The side aisles of our Church in Carrigtwohill would be packed with people waiting for their turn to confess.

On Christmas Morning we would rush to the kitchen table where our Christmas stocking with our name on it, would be lined up for the taking!

The contents were treasured; an orange, an apple, a doll for the girls and maybe a steam-roller for the boys.

In those days there was no mid-night Mass. The first Mass on Christmas Day was at 8.00am while the *High Mass* for the Feast to welcome the Christ Child was celebrated at 11.00am. Concelebrating with our Parish Priest, the late Canon Bowler and our Curate, Fr. O'Brien, were local priest of our parish who returned home for Christmas.

Among them were; Fr.'s Pat Barry, Ardglass, Luke Mulholland from the family who had the Post Office and Gabriel Barry of Templecuraheen who with Fr. Luke were both in the Carmelite Order

May they all now Rest in Peace.

Boyhood memories recall the solemn atmosphere at this *High Mass*, intoned in Latin and with the male voice choir singing the Gloria, Creed, Sanctus and the Agnus Dei.

The great organ was played eloquently by the late Sr. Raleni and she together with the other Poor Servants of the Mother of God, did then as they do to-day – share every hour and gift they have, with the people of our parish.

As our voices and music entwined, Heaven surely met Earth on this special occasion. After Mass, which lasted an hour, we headed home with the echoes of Adeste Fideles and Silent Night in our hearts and minds.

The aroma of the bastible cooked roast goose greeted us as we approached the door. The plum pudding was having it's final boil in the skillet pot and together as a family, the dinner was enjoyed.

Following a nice cup of tea and a slice of Christmas cake, it was time for us to rest on our oars!

The day would conclude with a little glass of hot wine punch, plus a slice of cake after which the Rosary was recited together and then we went to bed.

Silent Night, Holy Night, now all was calm after a joyful celebration of the birth of Christ.

Why not make some of these easy sweet treats to give to your friends or grandparents or to someone special. They are very easy to make but make sure you have adult supervision when you are using the oven.

White Chocolate Truffles

142ml pot double cream, 1lb white chocolate chopped, icing sugar for dusting, 30 dried cranberries.

Line a large baking tray with baking paper or greaseproof paper.

Put the cream into a small saucepan

and bring just up to boiling point, remove from the heat and stir in 9oz of chocolate until just melted, transfer into a bowl and leave to chill for at least an hour.

Dust your hands with icing sugar, take 1 tsp of the mixture and roll into a ball.

Repeat with the remaining mixture. Place all the balls on the lined tray and put into the freezer for at least 30 minutes

Melt the remaining chocolate over a pan of simmering water, dip the truffles into the melted chocolate using a fork and leave to dry on sheets of greaseproof paper. While the chocolate is still wet place a cranberry on top of each truffle and leave to set for at least 30 minutes.

For more grown up truffles add 2 tbsp brandy or rum or your favourite liqueur at the same time as the chocolate.

Peppermint Creams

11b icing sugar, 1 tsp lemon juice, 1 egg white, lightly whisked, few drops peppermint flavouring, few drops of green food colouring.

Mix the sugar and lemon juice together in a bowl with enough of the egg white to make a pliable mixture. Add the peppermint flavouring and food colouring, dust your work surface with icing sugar and knead the dough

before rolling out and cutting into circles with a biscuit cutter.

Leave for 24 hours to dry thoroughly.

For all chocolate lovers you can dip half in melted chocolate and leave to dry.

Honeycomb

7oz caster sugar, 4 tbsp golden syrup, 1 tbsp bicarbonate of soda

Butter a deep sided 8" round tin, put the sugar and syrup into a pan and heat gently, continuing to stir until the sugar melts.

Simmer for 2-3 minutes or until the mixture is thick, bubbling and a light golden colour, remove from the heat and quickly whisk in the bicarbonate of soda.

When the caramel has foamed into a golden cloud, immediately pour into the tin – it will rise up again. Leave to set for a few hours, then bash or cut into pieces.

This is really delicious crushed into tiny pieces and sprinkled over vanilla ice cream.

Gingerbread men

350g plain flour, 1 tsp ground ginger, 1 tsp bicarbonate of soda, 100g butter, 175g soft brown sugar, 1 egg, 4 tbsp golden syrup.

Combine the flour, ginger and bicarbonate into a bowl, rub in the butter. Add the sugar, then stir in the egg and syrup to make a firm dough, Roll out to 1cm thickness then cut into shapes.

Add raisins for eyes.

Cook in a reheated oven 180oC/350oF/Gas 4 for 12 mins. Leave to cool then decorate with icing. Allow to set.

Punch a hole in the top before you put it into the oven and when its set you can thread some ribbon though the hole and hang on to your Christmas tree.

At the end of Green Lunchbox Week, the rubbish of the school was down to half the usual amount.

Birgit O Driscoll, from East Cork Area Development visited the school for one full day. She works with all the schools in the area that are registered with *Green-Schools* programme. She told the girls about the importance of recycling. She showed the girls some pictures of people sorting the recycling and this emphasised how important it is to wash out cartons and containers before recycling them.

She also showed them the recycling sign and also the repak sign (green dot). The recycling sign is a triangle made of arrows with a number in the middle. This symbol can be found at the base of most yoghurt cartons. This symbol should not be confused with the repak sign which simply means that the company that made the product is funding recycling facilities throughout the country.

By law, companies that make packaging are obliged to do this. This does not mean the chocolate bar wrapper that has the repak sign (green dot) is recyclable.

Recycle for Christmas

The green school committee would like to remind everyone that we are approaching a time of year that generates a lot of rubbish. Some wrapping paper needlessly ends up in landfill. This year, try to recycle all your wrapping paper.

Open big presents carefully and use the big sheets of wrapping paper for wrapping smaller gifts or keep wrapping paper for party games such as pass the parcel. Think of other alternatives. Many shops do Christmas gift boxes. These can be tied with reusable ribbon from a haberdashery and the box and ribbon can be used again by the recipient of the present.

On the twelfth day of Christmas, the box can always be used to store decorations till the following year. Wrapping paper is on sale in the school in aid of school funds. Please notice that we put a sticker on each packet of school wrapping paper to remind buyers to recycle it

Compulsory Purchase Orders are presently being negotiated and hopes are very high for a successful outcome and that being the case work will get under way as quickly as possible. Everyone is aware of the danger and urgency of the situation.






