# Carrigtwohill Community Council

"Volunteerism is the voice of the people put into action. These actions shape and mould the present into a future of which we can all be proud." Helen Dyer.

Carrigtwohill Community Council is a voluntary body elected by the people to represent the interests of the Carrigtwohill area. As well as the elected members there are also a number of people co-opted onto the Council usually because of their involvement in various sub-committees.

The Community Council is affialiated to Muintir na Tire which is the national umbrella organisation for Community Councils. Muintir na Tire was founded in 1937 by Canon Hayes. Its aims were to enhance the capacities of people in communities, rural and urban, to become involved in local social, economic, cultural and environmental development based on neighbourliness, self help and self reliance. His philosophy was based on the Irish proverb "Nil neart go cur le Cheile" which roughly translates as – together we are stronger.

Elections to Carrigtwohill Community Council are due to be held next Spring and anyone living in the Parish is eligible to be elected. So how does the community council operate and what is involved in being a member? The work of the Community Council is done by various sub committees who report to the Council at the monthly meeting which is held on the 1<sup>st</sup> Tuesday of every month. Below are some of the activities of the community council.

### **Tuesday Club**

This provides a social outlet for retired people and senior citizens. They meet in the Community Centre every Tuesday morning at 10a.m. They now have over forty members. Their activities are many and varied. These range from computer classes to keepfit, yoga, arts and crafts, flower arranging, card playing, bowls and bingo.

They go on outings and trips and the highlight of this year was the trip to meet the President Michael D Higgins. They are also involved with the younger generation through visits from Transition year students and teaching primary school students to knit. Long may they continue!

# Community Care.

This committee provide support to families who have been bereaved by providing refreshments after funerals. No charge is made for this service but donations up to a guideline of 2 euro per head are welcomed. The committee also organises a special needs party every year in December and it is always very well attended. As one of the beneficiaries of the Barryscourt 5K run the committee help with the refreshments for the runners.

### **Car Boot Sales**

About eight Car Boot Sales are held every year. They were originally held to raise funds for the Playground but once that project was completed they were so successful it was decided to continue with them and they are now provide income towards the running costs of the Community Centre.

### **Community Centre**

Carrigtwohill Community Centre which was built to provide a recreational and social outlet for local people celebrated its 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary last year.

It continues to be a very busy place. It is used by many clubs and organisations from the village and wider community. Among the activities using the facility are Bamninton, Bowls, Tuesday Club, Zumba, Pilates, Speech and Drama, Dancing, Taekwando and Weight Watchers.

Parties are held there by various organisations and community groups. The blood bank hold several clinics there every year. The Meals on Wheels operate out of the kitchen there 3 times a week. Rooms are available for hire for meetings etc.

### **Festival Committee**

The Community Council has had a festival committee for many years and the type of festival held has changed and developed over the years from the Fair Day to the Medieval Festival to the Cultural Street festival held this year.

### **All Weather Pitch**

Like the Playground the development of the All weather Pitch arose from the need to provide facilities for the growing population in the village and surrounding area.

It has now been operational for the past three years and is a much used and popular amenity.

### **Carrigtwohill Community News**

This is a Community Council publication. It is produced 3 to 4 times per year.

It is entirely funded by our advertisers and is delivered free into all the houses in the village and surrounding area.

This is the 21st edition of the magazine.

# **Tidy Towns**

The Community Council has always been involved in Tidy Towns, planting trees, bulbs, shrubs all around the village, but in the last year has decided to concentrate more fully on this project.

Hence people in high viz jackets were to be seen all over the village and surroundings picking litter, sweeping, painting, weeding all to very good effect as you can read about elsewhere in the magazine.

### **Local Authority Liasion/Environment**

Since the mid 1990s this committee has been making submissions to Cork County Council re Local Area Plans and developments, underlining the need for roads, green areas, schools and other amenities.

At a more local level this involved lobbying for the filling in of pot holes, provision of bus shelters, repair of street lighting etc. As Carrigtwohill has no Urban District Council all of this work had to be undertaken by volunteers working in their spare time and around their other commitments.

This is a summary of some of the activities undertaken by Carrigtwohill Community Council so whether you have lived here for years or have only just arrived we would ask you to consider volunteering when the elections take place next Spring.

# **Overall Development Approach:**

Thank you to Carrigtwohill Tidy Towns Committee for your entry for 2012. Thank you for the submission, the photos, the map, your plan to 2014 and the copies of your community news. The jubilant faces of your senior hurlers is testimony to the well-being of your community.

It is evident from your submission that the grass was not allowed to grow under your feet since last year's competition. You have expanded your committee. Also you have formulated your plans for the coming years. Great progress. Your ambition is obvious throughout your submission, for instance, your determination to achieve medal status by 2015 or your determination to enlarge your meitheal of workers to 100. Admirable. Already you appear to have a fine meitheal of volunteers. Businesses seem to have been won over and are willing to assist. Your website mentions the enormous expansion of the town envisaged in the next few years. Creating a 'sense of ownership' of that change in a sustainable manner is a worthy objective for your Tidy Towns group.

The involvement of the schools is a key objective of Tidy Towns and one is pleased to read of your progress in this regard. Specific projects as you have described are more effective with the young than mere talking. Long may Tidy Towns continue to be a driving force in your Carrigtwohill community. You include many photos. If including a photo ensure you write down why the photo is being included.

### The Build Environment:

Lets start with the main street. While there are recent changes to the built structure of the main street most of the buildings have seen generations come and go. These buildings have not only housed families but housed businesses of all sorts. These buildings have seen massive changes to the street. Who would have expected ten years ago that so many of the buildings would now be providing international cuisine to the Carrigtwo-hill natives. These buildings deserve all of the respect your community can bestow on them. How proper it is that you would tend to the infirm buildings by painting, camouflaging, art work until their next usage is decided.

Dereliction is always a transient challenge. You are coping well. Have you any plans for the preservation of your castle? It is seldom that there are schools bang in the middle of town. One expects that the pupils bring life to the street during term. All school buildings enhance their surroundings. Great to see the green flags flying in the town centre.

The street that includes the Church has many challenges to face. But again you recognise the problems and you are taking action. The Church is a most attractive design. Your GAA complex is a tribute to the spirit of volunteerism in your town. The Gaeilge makes an appearance every now and then. Teach an tsagairt caught the adjudicator's eye.

It is equally meaningful in some estates like Cul Ard. Get the clock to work on the clock tower.

### Landscaping:

The adjudicator was struck by the quality of the design and the finish of the timber of your plant and tree containers. These seem to be unique to Carrigtwohill and they are most attractive in their present presentation.

One feels that they are expensive and also expensive to keep

flowers and plants in so be judicious in how you site them. The adjudicator was not sure that the two at the Community Centre might not be considered a traffic hazard as there appears to be a lot of vehicular traffic in and out of that entrance. The landscaping at estates will also be mentioned under residential but deserves a mention here also. The decking in Cluain Cairn was an unusual feature and suggests a time to relax. The approach roads are most attractive. Your ongoing policy of tree planting is commendable also. When considering your landscaping plans do take account of feeding bees, birds and insects. Ensure that your planting in not for visual use only.

### Wildlife and Natural Amenities:

Good to read that you are providing amenity paths for Carrigtwohill. The other projects with bat boxes and the wild flower garden are worthy initiatives in the wildlife section. The report of 2011 mentions a biodiversity survey that had been completed. One feels from your Plan for Year 1 that it has not been completed. Include the main findings in next year's wildlife submission. Use the survey as the basis for some wildlife projects. In Year 2 of your plan the 'Implement Wildlife Plan' statement is too nebulous. The danger in not being specific in your statements is that nothing will happen.

### **Litter Control:**

Your litter picks and meetings with the warden etc are paying dividends. There is some litter as in the walkway at the Millenium Park but of a low level variety. So there is an improvement from the comments of last year's report. But the adjudicator feels that there is not sufficient emphasis on litter awareness in your litter strategies. The adjudicator does not want to weigh you down with sermonising on good practice. You develop your own unique Carrigtwohill approach to reducing the amount of litter. The Green Flag Status of the schools does filter into the communal psyche. Involvement of the youth, as is your practice, will help eliminate this bad practice from our future adults. Keep up the good work.

### **Tidiness:**

This category is challenging for you on a number of fronts. We have dealt with dereliction. You mentioned the road surface from Costcutter out to the N25, very poor. The advertising on the boards that serve a great purpose but are defaced by the advertising boards nailed onto them. The style and script of many of the shop signs conflict with the traditional approach to shop signs. These signs detract from the street appearance and create a careless impression. This is your town. Create a coordinated theme that you feel represents your town. The hedge as one approaches the junction at Costcutter is interfering with the has not neglected their provision. road sign. One day the cables will be ducted. These are the negatives. There are many positives. The presentation of most of the buildings on main street, the weed free footpaths, the neat verges, the maintained shrubberies and flower beds, the sweeping of the street are among the positives. It is these positives that point up what is not so good.

### **Waste Minimisation:**

It was worth including the Community News with your submission just to let the adjudicator know that you are actively promoting the minimisation of use of energy in your community. Continue haranguing your community with the message. Your submission tells of the various other projects that you have undertaken this year, all admirable. All Green Flag activities are worthwhile. Continue to inform your committee, note

your committee, about the objectives and the practices involved in waste minimisation. Recycling is a mere element of what is required to be successful in this section. Have you taken the advice of last year's adjudicator and consulted the Tidy Towns Handbook regarding waste minimisation?

### **Residential Areas:**

The figures for population increase in your town are staggering. Your initiative in setting up Residents Associations is a noble response. Integration of the new comers is a priority. If your hurlers keep up the good work then that integration will be made all the easier. There is no better way to integrate a community than by involving them in work that puts community first. Many estates were visited in the town and in general they present themselves very well. New estates, as in Fota Rock, are creating superb places in which to live by maintaining the fine landscaping infra structure already in place. Older estates and terraces are adding to the residential experience also in their landscaping and in the presentation of the road frontage of their estates. Well maintained housing contributes to creating a healthy community. Inter estate competition and garden competition is the next step, in order to spice up the rivalry between areas while improving appearance. It is in your plan for year 1. Cúl Árd would have to tend to its entrance.

### Roads, Streets and Back Areas:

Many of the approach roads to Carrigtwohill are a delight to travel. Wide expanses of roadway with neatly trimmed verges, trees planted along banks, residents contributing to the colour with their individual choices of hedging, shrub colours and texture, schemes of houses that light up their particular part of the road with their communal theme. The approach road from the motorway is still functional in appearance and needs to be

The approach from the railway station provides many challenges even if it is presented beautifully in some instances. This road needs special attention.

A walk to examine the back of the Community Centre became the highlight of the visit to Carrigtwohill. What a Pandora's box of delights. Firstly there is the car park. Next the Bring Centre comes into view and is well maintained. Next up is the childrens' playground. A wonderful amenity and busy too. It would have been a disaster not to have strolled in here because now I am in the Millenium Park. What a facility. That looks like a Carrigtwohill Stonehenge down there. The journey down takes one through a wilderness on a lovely path. Beautiful pitches. Well done and the planting on the way in must get a mention. Cycle lanes also create a peace and Carrigtwohill

# **General Impression:**

The adjudicator admires your aspirations with regard to 'community development and integration'. These are worthy motives. Creation of Residents Associations is a major step in community activity. Community based ambitions are of far greater importance to the Tidy Towns ideals than the winning of medals in a certain time scale.

If your plans for improving the sense of community in Carrigtwohill reach fruition you can be assured that marks will increase and you will be rewarded with your medal. But for now 'Look after the pennies.....' The medals will follow.

# Tenders to be Sought for €17.48M Upgrade of Carrigtwohill Wastewater

We have been notified by David Stanton T.D. of the approval by the Minister for the Environment, Phil Hogan TD for Cork County Council to seek tenders for works on Carrigtwohill Wastewater Plant.

These works, which will cost an estimated €17.48 million, will include the upgrading of the wastewater treatment plant and the three main pumping stations in the town.

The upgrading works will mean the facility complies with the EU's Urban Wastewater Treatment Directive (91/271/EC) ensuring Carrigtwohill's Wastewater services meet national standards for sewerage treatment and effluent discharges.

# Carrigtwohill Community Bowls Club

# **Tidy Towns Committee**

A report of the Tidy Towns Adjudicators 2012 is contained in this newsletter for the information of the whole community. The results in 2012 showed an increase of 15 points over 2011 and this was a remarkable achievement.

In addition the Committee was given an Endeavour Award with a monetary value of €500.

The Competition is a huge challenge to every town and in Carrigtwohill the Committee met this challenge head on in 2012 and the results offer great encouragement to the committee and the volunteers who showed such dedication to the completion of a range of projects.

The report also provides very helpful feedback on how the adjudicators viewed the projects and their very advice is very welcome.

# **Residents Associations**

Over the last decade the population of Carrigtwohill has increased dramatically.

The most recent census shows that the numbers have increased from 2,782 in 2006 to 4,551 in 2011, an increase of 64%. Unfortunately this development has coincided with the economic downturn and no new infrastructure has been put in place to provide for the needs of the increasing numbers.

The Community Council recognised the need for a programme of community to integrate the new residents and to give them a sense of belonging in Carrigtwohill.

A Strategic Plan to examine these needs and solutions for this problem was commissioned. One of the recommendations was that the Tidy Towns Competition would become a focus for the Community Council and with this in mind the members were encouraged to become part of the Tidy Towns Committee. This was extremely successful and several members bought into the ideals of Tidy Towns.

A public meeting was held on 20 March 2012 where the new revitalised Tidy Towns Committee put forward a three year plan to 2015.

Within this plan, it was proposed that the Tidy Towns Committee would facilitate the setting up of Residents Associations in all estates in the village, new and old, public and private.

The purpose of setting up the Residents Associations was to create within their own estates, a sense of ownership and pride in the environment in which they live. The success of this development has been extraordinary with Residents Associations being established to date in a number of estates.

The upshot of this has been

that over 100 people have on occasion been working together on various projects in the village. Its success can also be measured by the astonishing level of regeneration in some of the older estates.

Reports of the activities of a number of the Residents Associations have been submitted to the editor and these reports will give a much clearer picture of the success levels achieved by the residents in those estates in 2012.

You may have noticed some random flytipping in recent times, particularly on the slip road out of the Barryscourt roundabout and in a number of other areas around the village.

The Cork County Council Litter warden has been very helpful to us in examining these incidents and the culprits will face charges in due time.

# Merck Millipore invests in new technology at their Carrigtwohill facility.

Merck Millipore are at an advanced stage of construction on a €3.5M investment to upgrade the Wastewater Treatment Plant at their Carrigtwohill facility. Merck Millipore wish to highlight that during January/February 2013, the construction phase will involve the demolition and safe disposal of old equipment and consequently there is a higher risk of odour during this period of time.

Merck Millipore Management is committed to ensuring the overall project meets the target timelines to have an additional biological treatment tank in operation by the end of December and the new odour treatment equipment in operation by end of March 2013.

Oliver Sheehan, Carrigtwohill Community Council Chairman, visited the Merck Millipore site during the first week of October and had the opportunity to tour the construction site and see first hand the progress of the investment.

Merck Millipore is a division of Merck KGaA, one the of worlds leading pharmaceutical, chemical and life science companies with 40,000 employees spread over 67 countries.

Merck Millipore Ireland was established in 1988 and since then has been a major employer in Carrigtwohill ,East Cork area.

The Carrigtwohill site manufactures membrane filters and filtration devices which are used in a wide range of applications requiring precision filtration and purification. The main activities of the site include membrane casting, plastic moulding and the assembly of small-area filtration devices.

Merck Millipore provide technology, tools and services for the development of new therapies and drugs that enable people to live longer and healthier. For example MM products are used to purify a range of applications from apple juice to insulin.

In addition to manufacturing Merck Millipore operate a direct sales and technical support office out of the site in Carrigtwohill, Co. Cork.

# Carrigtwohill Garda Forum 25th April 2012

**Meeting Minutes** 

Location: Carrigtwohill Community Centre

**Attendees:** Sergeant Eamonn O'Connor, Oliver Sheehan Community Council, approximately 46 people attended.

Meeting opened by Oliver Sheehan, followed by Sergeant O'Connor who commented on the good behaviour of the youth of Carrigtwohill and praised the spirit of the community. Also read out sections of 2 letters sent to Gardai with issues. Sergeant reported that there have been 6 houses burglarised 3 weekends ago.

Questions from floor included:

# Q. How to manage anti-social behaviour?

A. Don't hesitate to ring Gardai. Anti-social forms can be served.

### Q What comes after an anti-social form?

A. 100% Compliance is the local Gardai experience of antisocial forms served in Carrigtwohill. If an individual gets a 2<sup>nd</sup> in 3 months, they are put in front of Superintendant. May be referred to Juvenile Liaison Officer if reoffend repeatedly (Under 18 year olds).

# Q. Road safety risk outside Girls National School was raised.

A. Sargent recommends that people to report registration plate of car of offender to Gardai as soon as possible. Local Gardai did make a submission to Midleton/Carrigtwohill Transportation Study for a Single yellow line but this has not been implemented. Community Council to talk to New Area Engineer.

### Q. Dog fouling/loose uncontrolled/unaccompanied dogs

**A.** Report to Dog Warden. Tidy Towns looking at Dog poobins. Loose dogs must be accompanied by a person over 16 years old.

### O. Litter

A. Report to Litter Warden.

### Q. Abandoned vehicles

**A.** Local Authority can remove same – Phone Gardai.

### Q. What to do when station is closed?

A. Leave a note in the letter box and they will arrange to meet with you.

# **Parking in Public Areas**

Theft from cars and other vehicles is a common crime in Ireland today. Ideally, property should not be left unattended in cars or other vehicles. However, if you must, please bear in mind the following-

- Ensure all windows are closed and all doors are locked.
- Ensure that your alarm/immobiliser is set
- Do not leave property on view inside your vehicle
- Do nor leave cash, credit/debit cards, cheque books or other valuable items inside your vehicle
- Do not leave personal documents driving licence, insurance certificate, utility bills, bank statements etc.) as this can facilitate identity theft or lead criminals to your home address
- Be particularly careful with laptops, mobile phones and other small electronic items as the data they contain may be very attractive to the thief.
- Do not place property under the seat it is not a secure location and can often be seen
- If you must store property in your vehicle, place it in the boot but do so at a location other than the area where you intend to park
- Avoid parking in isolated places and at night time park in a well-lit area
- Consider retracting, where possible your wing mirrors as flush as possible to the doors to avoid criminal damage.

The above recommendations equally apply when parking at home. If you have a garage, park your vehicle inside it and keep your garage locked.

Satellite navigation systems are becoming very popular and as a result are being targeted by thieves. The following guidelines can help to reduce the risk of your equipment being stolen-

- Avoid leaving portable Sat Navs in your vehicle
- Take them with you when leaving your car including the support cradle and suction pads
- Wipe away any suction pad marks left n the dashboard or windscreen
- Security mark your Sat Nav with your vehicle registration number

Do not programme your Sat Nav to indicate home.

# Carrigtwohill All Weather Facility Reflects on 2012 and Eagerly Awaits 2013

The clocks have gone back and the winter is well and truly here. A clear sign of this in Carrigtwohill is the fact that not a week night goes by without seeing the floodlights shining down on the hive of activities at Carrigtwohill All Weather Facility. We are into our busiest time of year with people travelling from Cork city and county to avail of Carrigtwohill All Weather Facility.

With the curtain almost fully drawn on 2012, I would like to take this opportunity to reflect on some of the initiatives which took place over the past year.

Secondly, I will look forward to 2013 and give you an idea of what activities we expect to run at the facility.

Carrigtwohill Community Council Limited appointed me as Community Development and Facilities Administrator in April of this year. One of the primary roles of this position involves the administration of the All Weather Facility.

With my background in Sport and Exercise Sciences along with my experience in coaching, I quickly realised the huge potential the facility had to offer.

Isaac Newton's famous expression 'If I have seen further it is by standing on the shoulders of giants' quickly came to mind for me however.

If it weren't for the vision and work ethic of those responsible for establishing this facility then none of the following programmes would have been possible to orchestrate.

# Friday Night Youth Activity

Strengthening the Friday Night Youth Activity hour was my first target. This programme, an idea adopted from Dublin Late Night Soccer Leagues, involves giving teenagers in the community an opportunity to play sport with their friends in a safe and semi-structured setting.

Soccer is currently played with mainly local male teenagers in the community participating. It takes place every Friday night from 1930 – 2030 at a cost of €2.00 per person.

All are welcome to come down and check out the lads showing off their silky skills.

# **After Schools Activity Programme**

The After Schools Activity Programme (ASAP) took place during the months of May and June. This was run with the help of the staff in Scoil Chlochair Mhuire. It took place for one hour after school on five consecutive Wednesdays and was open to all girls in first class.

The primary aim of the programme was to give children a **safe**, **structured** and **professionally supervised** environment where they could learn new skills and be physically active.

Overall the programme was a huge success due to numbers in attendance, the help from parent volunteers and the enthusiasm and cooperation from the children.

### **FUNdamental Movement Skills Summer Camp**

A three week FUNdamental Movement Skills Summer Camp was organised during the months of July and August. It was aimed at children in national school from junior infants to second class. Similar to the ASAP, the programme content included developing children's' Fundamental Movement Skills (FMS) and achieving the recommended daily amount of physical activity (www.getirelandactive.ie).



FMS are basic movements required to allow a child to perform many sports and games at a competent level. These include movements such as running, jumping, throwing, catching, kicking and striking. Over 40 children attended the camp and volunteers helped on a daily basis.

### 2013

The challenge for 2013 is to build on and create more of these innovative projects.

I plan to open up the ASAP to more classes and to both Scoil Chlochair Mhuire and Scoil Mhuire Naofa.

Currently the Friday Night Youths involves male teenagers.

I attempted to establish an hour for female teenagers

earlier this year but it didn't succeed.

I am confident this can be done with the help of others in the community sooner rather than later.

If anyone is interested in getting involved in any of these projects please contact me as the involvement of volunteers is paramount to the success of these community programmes.

The facility is also available for hire hourly throughout the year at very competitive rates. Many companies and clubs in the East Cork area are availing of the all-weather surface. Among these are Carrigtwohill United AFC, Midleton FC, Leeside AFC, Glounthaune United, Stryker Orthopaedic and GE Healthcare.

Finally there is a part-time Sports Development Facilitator position currently available with Carrigtwohill Community Council under the FÁS CE Scheme.

The primary role of the position will involve working at the All Weather Facility assisting me in the running of the facility.

The Chairman of the Tidy Towns Committee and the Chairman of the Community Council set up a meeting with the residents of Maryville Estate in April of 2012 to discuss the possibility of establishing a Residents Association.

This recommendation had been made in the National Tidy Towns Adjudication Reports over the years and following on the success of other Residents Associations it was an opportune time to work with Maryville.

The meeting was held locally and a very large number of the residents attended and they were very keen to set up a structure to look after their estate and bring it up the standard of the other estates in the area.

The Association was set up and plans were made for improvements almost immediately.

The green area at the back of Maryville was in a very poor condition, with a lot of overgrowth and the grass had been left uncut and was very unsightly. The Community Council Lawnmower was provided to the Residents Association and work on the green started, the overgrowth was cut back, the grass was mowed and the whole area was upgraded to a very high standard.

An Taisce organised a clean up day at the end of April and the residents of Maryville joined in and helped to clear up all the litter around the estate. There was a huge turnout on the day and a very large amount of litter was collected.

Adults and children were involved in this project and clearly the involvement of the children has helped to keep Maryville litter free since then.

The wall to the west of the estate was overgrown with bushes with a very untidy fence holding the wall together. This fence was used as a disposal area for cans and bottles and various pieces of rubbish. The Committee decided that the fence should be removed and be replaced with a capped wall of local stone. This project was completed in a very short time and flowers and plants have been placed where once the litter was left. The wall is an outstanding project and an example of the level of expertise and skills that exist within the Maryville community being put to such great use.

Other projects included the painting of the external wall on the street and plans are afoot for the upgrading of the capping of this wall in 2013.

The Committee is also continuing to maintain a very high standard of grass cutting and upkeep of the estate. The trees have been trimmed and are being well looked after. The Residents are very proud of the appearance of their estate and will con-



Of course, such growth brings its own challenges, for instance in terms of coaching staff, as the club complies with the "two deep" FAI rules which requires a minimum of two coaches present during any activity.

In practice, each group of players is covered by three coaches. All of the club's coaches have obtained the FAI level one coaching qualification, specialising on the needs of underage players.



# In the Garden

#### with Michael Clancy, Fota Garden Centre

In times gone by, winter work in the garden used to be compared to investing in a good pension plan. All your effort would be rewarded at a later date. Times have changed in financial services, but Mother natures goal posts remain firmly intact.

The weather has been difficult and unpredictable but I cannot help being optimistic about spring. Optimism cost nothing and may help me to endure the winter months. As a gardener, I find myself looking forward a lot and anticipating the future. In order to get the most out of the future, some garden projects have to be tackled now.

Winter pruning is essential throughout the garden and it is very important to learn the times to prune each different plant. I get very annoyed with large commercial landscapers who tend to be guided by convenience rather than what is technically correct.

Cornus alba or dog wood as it is commonly known, is used on a large scale through out the countryside. It is grown primarily for its red branches which stand up in the middle of winter in landscapes with little other colour. The correct time to prune Cornus alba is March, just as the new growth has begun. At this point, cut the Cornus down to within 2 inches from the ground level. Very few plants should be given such brutal treatment.

Pay particular attention to the flowering time of the plant material in your garden and a very simple rule of thumb is, if it flowers early in the spring then you cannot prune it until well into the summer.

Hedges like Escalonia can benefit from a clipping, if they haven't already gotten one. This will give them a nice tidy appearance during the winter months. Laurel hedges can be clipped at any point during the year without causing any damage.

Because of the severe winters we had a few years ago, I feel it would be for the best if tender hedges like Grisolinia were left alone until the spring. The extra foliage insulates the main stems of the plants against freezing.

I like to give Roses a trim with a shears at

this time of year, this will reduce rocking in stormy conditions and the beds will look a lot tidier as a result. There is very little merit in having your roses blooming at Christmas time, this will reduce the blooming in the summer months when they are supposed to be blooming.

A good top dressing of farmyard manure at this time of year is great as it will have the winter months to leach down through the soil and condition the soil in the proc-

Some years it is possible to cut your lawn all year round, a lot depends on access to your lawn due to wet conditions rather than cold weather.

Winter pruning is essential throughout the garden and it is very important to learn

It's always important to keep leaves off the lawn as over time they will do a lot of damage to the grass underneath.

Edging the lawn at this time of year will improve the overall appearance of the garden.

When all pruning is completed, top dress your beds with a good quality bark mulch. When applied to a depth of approximately 4 inches, this will prevent a large amount of weed seeds from germinating, the root will be insulated from freezing conditions and water will be conserved during the summer months.

Many borders can look boring during the winter months, have a look in the garden centre for some winter flowering heathers to bring a bit of new life into your garden. Pseudowinterii is one of my favourite plants at this time of year, the colour of the foliage remains the same through out the year, but at this time there are a lot of colours around that compliment it. Drimys lanceola is another plant which seems to shine during the winter months, the red stems become more evident and contrast well with the rich dark foliage.

Leucothoe are available in a couple of different varieties and both will provide great colour and interest at this time. Skimma are always very popular before Christmas, these are great in containers or in the open ground.

Cyclamens are a favourite for Christmas time, make sure, when planting they should be perched slightly above the level of the compost, this will keep the corm at the centre of the plant dry and enable the plant to flower better.

Heuchera are great for a bit of winter colour and will continue to give value all year long, watch out for vine weevil and destroy effected plants.

If you haven't planted any bulbs, you will still be able to purchase pot grown bulbs in the garden centre.






# Castlelake Lake and Wildlife Meadow - an amenity for all of Carrigtwohill

Its been a great few months in Castlelake with a wonderful replanting of the lake and the beginning of a renovation of the wildflower meadow. This is an amenity for all in Carrigtwohill to enjoy and its great to see the care and attention given by BAM Gable's Aquatic Biologist, Frances Gallagher and her team. Frances treated us all to a talk recently to fill us in on the plans for the lake and meadow. The children, in particular, were enthralled by the sight of the many fresh water invertebrates up close and hear about the diversity of the lake.

The wildflower meadow will be developed over the coming months. The diggers moved in recently under the careful supervision of Frances, Liam Kelly and his team. "We had to take it very slowly" said Frances, "to avoid trapping the many voles, shrews, frogs and other wildlife populating the meadow". "The area was mown back, leaving a strip around the edge and one larger area to provide refuge to wildlife and later scarified ready for planting." These will be planted with annual seeds to provide attractive wildlife-friendly flowers next spring and summer.

Members of Carrigtwohill's Men's Shed that is based in and supported by Castlelake, have developed nest boxes for the meadow and will also supply rustic seating for the area. It is hoped the boxes will attract a variety of bird life including Blue Tits, Grey Tits, Wrens, Robins, Spotted Fly Catchers and Wagtails. The meadow, when completed, with boast pretty meadow annuals including Poppies, Cornflowers, Corn Marigolds and White Canpion and small woodland areas, It will be a delightful place to meander through or simply sit and linger.

### Carrigtwohill History

#### **Terrysland**

The Terrys were among the many families of Norman origin who came to Ireland soon after the Barrys of Barryscourt arrival in 1175. Other names included Goulds, Coppingers, Skiddys, Trents, Newtons, Galways, Hodnetts, Sarsfields, De Clavilles.

Some of these settlers received a tenure of land from Lord Barrymore, built houses for themselves, acted like minor landlords to the peasant farmers and tenants. They collected the rents and paid a head rent to Lord Barrymore.

On arrival in Ireland the Terrys soon distinguished themselves in many fields including merchandise in Cork City. They soon rose in fame and wealth and became Freemen and Aldermen in the Cork Corporation. Between 1321-1628 the Terrys were Lord Mayors of Cork twenty-five times.

Around 1440 Sir William Savage of Cork granted land around Carrigtwohill to Sir William Terry. The townlands included Tibbotstown, Forrestown, Ballinsperry (Annesgrove) and direct south to within one field of the old Cobh Cross. Then eastwards on the southside as far as Paddy Geaney's farm boundary and included all his farm. The north side was by the now Annesgrove road as far as Greenville Cross. On the eastern side of the Railway Station, it included all the bogs on the north and south of the railway line and as far as the top of the hill near Tom Jeffers cottage.

The eastern boundary went south as far as the main road to Midleton and Carrigtwohill. From there the south line ended on the hill above Roche's Garage. Again northwards to include the now Rocklands Estate, The Rock, Pat Horgan's farm, Murnane's farm, Cul Carraige, the Pond field, and the Bawnmore.

After the Cromwellian rebellion in 1641, some of these lands were forfeited including Tibbotstown, Forrestown, Ballinsperrig (Joe Fentons) where a member of the Terry family resided. Some years later, Lord Boyle of Cork, whose son married Lord Barrymore's daughter, bought the remainder of Terrysland from Edward Terry as he feared some big gentleman might purchase it and perhaps make trouble for his daughter and son-in-law.

Being an expanded generation the Terrys had land in the Great Island, Rathcormack, Cloyne and Carrigaline, it was later forfeited in 1641. So influential were the Terrys that King James gave a grant of a Ferry from Passage to Carrigaloe to Patrick Terry. The present ferry is on the same site.

In 1615 Lord Boyle paid Eleazus Skiddy for releasing his interest to Patrick Terry (above) in the particle of Tithes in Great Island which he gave to Patrick Terry and his wife for 40 shillings per annum.

When the Earl of Cork, Lord Boyle, bought Terrysland he wrote the following statement:

"I Earl of Cork paid Edmund Terry of Carrigtwohill for all lands, parks, and tenements in the town of Carrigtwohill and surrounding fields, also Barryscourt knows as Terrysland the sum of £20 and upon his deed recovery and yield up to me all

his ancient deeds and evidences. I have made a lease of my whole purchase to his brother-in-law Betau Meev Megante for his use for 21 years at £7 sterling per annum. The transaction provided that Lord Boyle would pay the rent for a number of years. In 1629 he still owed £80 sterling and had not received the ancient deeds of the property he purchased.

Lord Boyles will makes interesting reading and whereas to prevent a great and powerful man from coming into the town of Carrigtwohill that might be offensive and prove an unpleasant neighbour to my daughter and son-in-law, the Earl purchased several burgages and burgage lands (e.g. Burgesland) hereditaments from the Newtons and Terrys who were the ancient founders, inheritors and freeholders thereof.

Edmund Terry was a wealthy merchant and a Freeman in the Cork Corporation. His daughter married Dominick Sarsfield of Sarsfields Court, Riverstown. His son William became Bishop of Cork and Cloyne in 1623. He had to leave Cork in 1644 when Catholics were ejected in the Penal Laws. He had taken part in the Confederation of Kilkenny.

The Sarsfields were land speculators and were presumed to live in Greenville for a while. Blessed William Terry was born in Cork in 1609. He received his education for the priesthood on the Continent and on his return became secretary to his uncle Bishop William Terry. Fr. William's first cousin William Sarsfield, Viscount Kilmallock asked him to become his Chaplin and to serve as tutor to his two sons.

During these years a Catholic Rebellion erupted but was suppressed and the Penal Laws enforced. Blessed William was appointed to the parish of Fethard in Co. Tipperary. He was arrested eleven years later and at his trial he acknowledged the power of the government on temporal matters but in spiritual matters wherein my soul is concerned, I acknowledge the Pope of Rome and my own superiors to have greater power over me than yours. He was convicted and hanged in the same year. Pope John Paul 11 beatified William Terry in 1993.

When Queen Elizabeth died in 1603 the citizens of Cork were divided in proclaiming James 1 as King. Edmund Terry as Lord Mayor of the City was amongst those who were opposed to the King and was treated as a rebel. Later when Lord Mountjoy the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland came with Oliver Cromwell they arranged for the confiscation of the Terry properties of Cork City and County including the Terry lands Forrestown, Annesgrove, Tibbotstown and Pat Horgans farm in Carrigane. Murnanes farm was also included. The Terrys were allowed only to possess the low lying land as now Paddy Geaneys with the boglands as far as near Ballyadam Bridge.

Later in the 1600's the Terrys recovered a good amount of the properties that were taken from them in the City of Cork. This happened when the former Lord Peers of the early 1600s had died. The extended families settled in parts of the city, in East Cork and in the Great Island of Cobh. Many of them were farmers, others were weavers in Ballincurrig Woolen Mills under John Cogan.

Eddie Dunlea's mother in law whose name was Terry and a



local resident in the area was a weaver in Ballincurrig

Records of the Terry families show that a Patrick Terry married a Bridget Geary in Carrigtwohill in 1823.

In 1871 a John Paul Terry was born at 25 Harbour View, Cobh. His brother is recorded as being born in Carrigtwohill. This family were the owners of a shop and bakery.

Mary E. Terry a merchant in Carrigtwohill married William O'Grady. A niece Josephine Terry lived with her. It is presumed William O'Grady took over the shop and bakery business. The above Josephine is referred to in the song The Bobbies of Carrig.

"Johnny at Terrys" he got a great fright He was pulled from his bed In the middle of the night He called up Miss Foe and it was his delight To sleep in the sofa for the rest of the night

The above synopsis of the Terrys of Cork history and genealogical settlement links is taken from the book, Terrys of Cork 1600-2000 by Kevin Terry, Coolboy, Cloyne, currently Director of Services and City Engineer with Cork City Council.

#### **Green Cleaning**

Instead of using harsh and toxic chemicals to clean your home why not use substances which are cheaper and are kinder to the planet. You will have more money in your pocket and protect the environment at the same time.

Common substances such as vinegar, lemon juice, baking soda (bicarbonate of soda) can be used in place of commercial cleaners.

White vinegar mixed with equals parts warm water makes an excellent window cleaner.

A similar mix can be used for cleaning the fridge.

Use full strength vinegar to polish chrome and stainless steel.

Neat vinegar will remove mould or mildew

Ants hate vinegar – so spray it around doorways etc.

Spray 50/50 mix of vinegar and water to soap scum on shower doors, leave then wipe or rinse off.

Bicarb of soda removes odours from carpets and rugs. Make sure the area is dry and sprinkle generously. Leave for up to an hour then vacuum up.

A paste of 50g of bicarb and 2tbsp water will clean silver. Rub on the paste and buff dry.

Bicarb is a great deodoriser so can be used on cat litter trays

Neat lemon juice can be used as a degreaser in the kitchen.

Use half a lemon to clean lime scale off a sink or taps.

A small amount of lemon juice can be added to vinegar based cleaning solutions to neutralise the smell of the vinegar.

An equal amount of lemon juice and water added to a spray bottle will create a chemical-free air freshener for your home.





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




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

### Ahern and Ryan Terrace Residents Association

On 20 March, 2012 the Tidy Towns Committee presented a three year plan at a public meeting held in the Community Centre. This plan included proposals for the setting up of Residents Associations in line with the recommendations of the National Tidy Towns Adjudication Reports over the years.

Officers of the Tidy Towns Committee met with the residents of Ahern and Ryan Terrace in April. This meeting took place by the Grotto in the Terrace to convenience the residents and to allow them the opportunity to talk about their own area within their own environment.

At this meeting it was agreed to set up the Residents Association. A further meeting was held where a Committee was elected and they set about drawing up proposals for improvements to upgrade the estate. In a short time, the wheels were put in motion and work began, slowly at first and then on to bigger projects. Arrangements were made for the collection of funds on a voluntary basis and this provided the finance to start work.

The green at the back of the Terrace was in a very poor condition, with a lot of overgrowth and the grass had been left uncut for quite some time. Approval for the use of the Community Council Lawnmower was given and very soon the green area was cleared, the overgrowth was cut back, the grass was mowed and brought up to a standard of a newly built terrace of houses. In addition the pathways between the houses and the back alleyways which were in very poor condition were cleaned and gravelled making access between the rows of houses much more pleasing.

The wall adjacent to No. 1 Ahern and Ryan Terrace was painted and this gave the whole estate an immediate lift. The kerbsides were repainted in black and amber and the grassed area at each side of the front footpath were edged and trimmed.

The Committee decided that the shrub bed in front of the white wall by the roadside was dangerous and blocked the view of

cars leaving the estate.

Proposals were agreed to remove the shrubbery and to erect a small wall outside by the road to improve the external appearance of the estate.

A design for the wall was drawn up and together with photographs of the project were referred to the local area engineer with a request for Council approval.

This approval was provided with a number of clauses regarding traffic management and safety measures to be met.

Work began on the foundation of the wall in September, 2012 as soon as the weather improved and the building of the wall was completed by the end of September. Work is currently underway on facing of the wall with limestone.

The Committee of the Residents Association is indebted to Robbie Sheehan of East Cork Plant Hire for his support and for the use of equipment. In addition, much thanks is due to the Lagan Group for their sponsorship of the materials for the building of the wall. The Association is very grateful in particular to Mr. John Curran, Business Director at the Lagan plant for his recognition of the work being done to upgrade the estate and for his encouragement and support with the supply of materials. Without the support of both Robbie and John, the project would have taken much longer and would have been very expensive. The Committee is confident that the wall and the area inside it will be completed in time for the Tidy Towns Adjudication of 2013.

The Committee is also continuing to maintain a very high standard of grass cutting and upkeep of the estate. External garden walls of houses have been painted, the Grotto continues to be maintained with flowers and painting, flower beds have been planted and in general the residents have bought into the concept of keeping their own estate clean and tidy and are very pleased with the results.

A compost area has been located at the end of green behind the estate and a hedge planted on the perimeter to block the area off from the public eye.

The Tidy Towns Committee continues to support the Residents Association with advice, with materials, with the use of the lawnmower and with help with project work and the Association is very grateful for this.

New Members are always welcome to join the Committee and any ideas about the development of our estate will be welcomed.

We look forward to continuing the good work already achieved and to making our estate one to be proud of and a great place to live.


We hope to make some more improvements next year to our estate to enhance the appearance of the estate even further.
